Year 10	The aim of GCSE study in year 10 is to build a broad and in-depth foundation of technical and sketchbook skill, whilst instilling a love for the subject. The course will be centred around visual analysis, idea generation, recording of ideas, experimentation and critical reflection. In the second half, students will begin the first of their coursework projects developing the key skills of artist research and analysis, which will culminate in the first half of year 11. There will be a 10-hour controlled assessment. Students will receive ongoing verbal and written feedback.
Year 11	The aim of Year 11 is to refine understanding of the generation and development of independent, creative ideas and high-quality outcomes. Students will be taught to hone their mastery of art and design techniques with a range of materials.		In year 11 students will place strong emphasis on refining understanding of the assessment objectives, ready for the exam which begins in January.

Year 13	Continue with personal investigation and related study until Christmas. From February students will work on the Externally set assignment. The exam board will provide a starting point theme which the investigation will be based around.		All coursework to be completed by the beginning of May, both the personal investigation and the ESA are completed with a 15-hour exam.
