Year 12	To enable students to: • demonstrate knowledge and understanding of psychological concepts, theories, research studies, research methods and ethical issues • apply psychological knowledge and understanding of the content in a range of contexts • analyse, interpret and evaluate psychological concepts, theories, research studies and research methods • evaluate therapies and treatments including in terms of their appropriateness and effectiveness In relation to the Paper 1 and 2 topics	<ul> <li>Paper 1: Introduction to Topics in Psychology</li> <li>Social Influence (Obedience, Conformity and Social Change)</li> <li>Memory (Models of memory, Forgetting and Eye witness testimony)</li> <li>Attachment (Explanations, Types of attachment and Long-term impacts)</li> <li>Psychopathology (Definitions, Phobias, Depression and OCD)</li> <li>Paper 2: Psychology in context</li> <li>Approaches in Psychology (Biological, Behavioural, Cognitive, Psychodynamic and Humanistic)</li> <li>Biopsychology (Functions of the brain and nervous system, hormones and neurotransmitters and ways of studying the brain)</li> <li>Research Methods (Scientific processes, Data handling and analysis, and inferential statistics)</li> </ul>	There will be nine taught hours per fortnight with lessons based on discussion of key concepts, leading to the production of effective classroom notes. Each topic is taught as a separate unit with a mid- and end-of—topic test for each. Exam technique is considered, developed and analysed throughout our curriculum delivery. Mock exams are used to monitor progress towards mastery of knowledge and skill areas.
